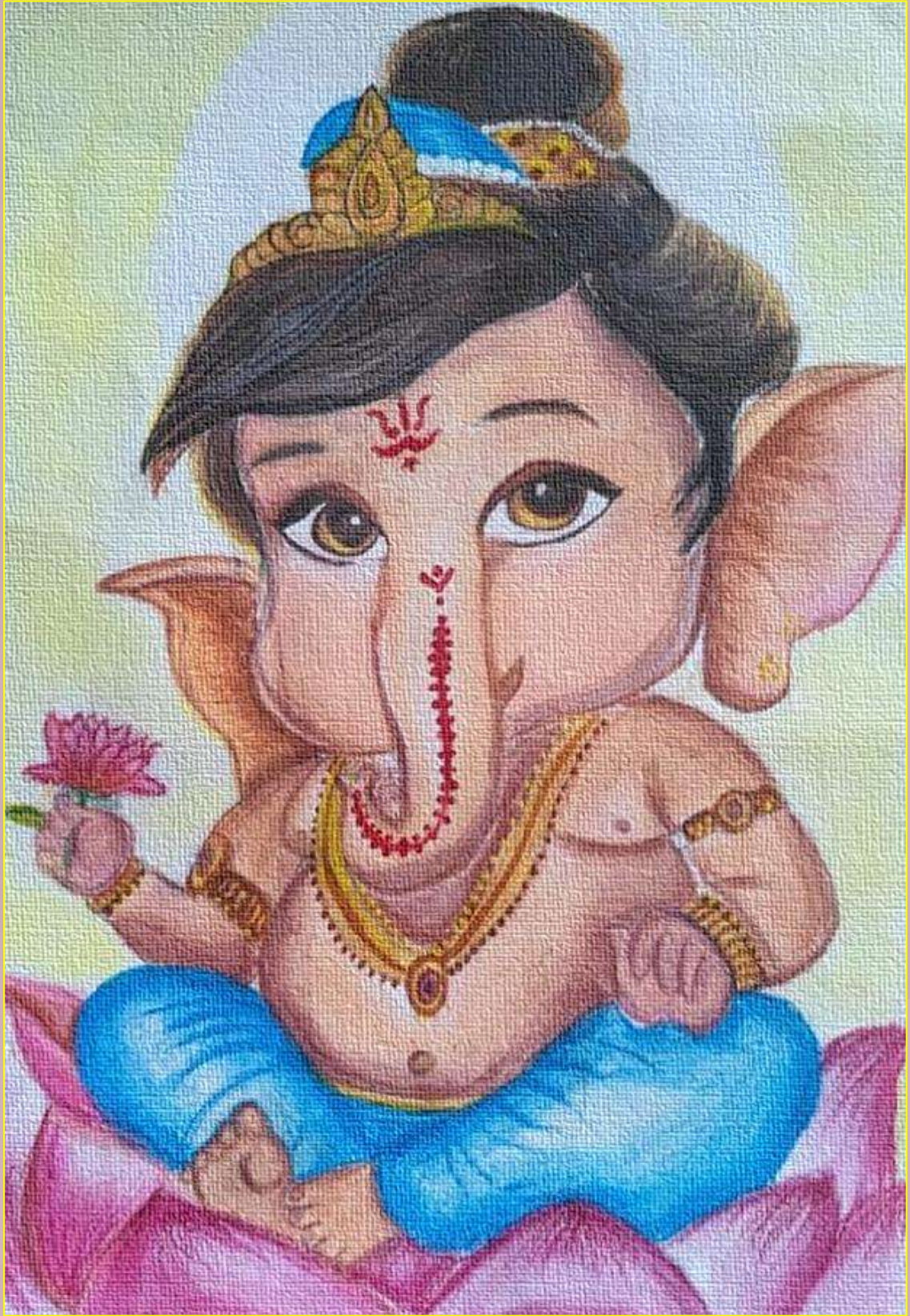

STUDENTS' CORNER

THE PULWAMA ATTACK

The Pulwama attack, which occurred on February 14, 2019, remains one of the most devastating and significant terrorist attacks in India's recent history. It took place in the Pulwama district of Jammu and Kashmir, a region that has long been a hotspot for conflict between India and Pakistan. On that fateful day, a convoy of 78 vehicles carrying Central Reserve Police Force personnel was ambushed by a suicide bomber. The bomber, Adil Ahmad Dar, who was reportedly a member of the Pakistan-based militant group Jaish-e-Mohammed, rammed an explosive-laden vehicle into one of the buses in the convoy. The explosion killed 40 CRPF personnel and injured several others, making it one of the deadliest attacks on Indian security forces in recent times.

The attack shook the nation, sending shockwaves across India and the world. Jaish-e-Mohammed, which has been linked to numerous attacks in India, claimed responsibility for the attack, further deepening tensions between India and Pakistan. This attack was part of a larger and more complex issue, which involves the long-standing dispute over the Kashmir region. The region has been a focal point of conflict between the two nuclear-armed nations, India and Pakistan, ever since their partition in 1947, with both countries claiming Kashmir in full but each controlling only a part of it.

In the wake of the attack, there was an outpouring of grief and anger from the Indian public, leading to national protests and calls for retaliation. The Indian government, led by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, condemned the attack in the strongest terms. The government blamed Pakistan for harbouring terrorists and providing them with safe havens, which led to widespread international condemnation of Pakistan. India's response came swiftly, with the Indian Air Force conducting airstrikes on a Jaish-e-Mohammed training camp in Balakot, Pakistan, on February 26, 2019. This marked an escalation in tensions between the two countries, with both nations engaging in aerial combat and diplomatic confrontations.

The Pulwama attack also brought the issue of terrorism to the forefront of global attention. India's accusations of Pakistan's involvement in sponsoring terrorism were echoed by many international leaders, and the attack served as a stark reminder of the continuing threat posed by militant groups operating in the region. The attack highlighted the vulnerability of Indian security forces in conflict zones, particularly in the volatile Kashmir Valley, where militancy and insurgency have been ongoing for decades.

In addition to the national and international ramifications, the attack had a profound impact on the lives of the soldiers' families and communities. The fallen soldiers were honoured with state funerals and tributes across India, with the nation paying homage to their courage and sacrifice. The grief was palpable, and the tragedy led to heightened patriotism and calls for justice.

The Pulwama attack also sparked debates about India's counter-terrorism strategies. While the Indian government has consistently claimed to adopt a hard-line stance against terrorism, the attack underscored the need for improved security measures and a comprehensive approach to counter-terrorism. It also raised questions about the effectiveness of intelligence gathering and the need for stronger coordination among various security agencies.

In conclusion, the Pulwama attack was a moment of sorrow and anger for India, but it also served as a catalyst for political, diplomatic, and military actions. It reinforced the importance of addressing the root causes of terrorism, including cross-border militancy and regional conflicts. While the attack deepened the animosity between India and Pakistan, it also united the Indian people in their resolve to stand against terrorism and honour the sacrifices made by their soldiers. The legacy of the Pulwama attack continues to shape the discourse on security, national unity, and the fight against terrorism in the region.

MAHASHIVARATRI: THE NIGHT OF SPIRITUAL AWAKENING

Mahashivaratri is an important Hindu festival celebrated on the thirteenth or fourteenth day of the month of Magha. It is a sacred night for devotees of Lord Shiva, who is the main deity of this festival. On this auspicious day, people observe a strict fast, stay awake all night, and meditate on Lord Shiva. Worshipping Shiva on this night is said to bring self-control, happiness, peace, success, and devotion. It also helps people get rid of negative thoughts and energy. Throughout the night, devotees chant "Om Namah Shivaya," a powerful mantra dedicated to Lord Shiva.

Mahashivaratri is also associated with deep meditation, as Lord Shiva is known for his intense meditation. This day encourages people to meditate, seek wisdom, and attain inner peace. It is considered a symbol of spiritual enlightenment and moksha (liberation). According to some beliefs, Mahashivaratri is the night when Lord Shiva performed the Tandava, a cosmic dance that represents creation, preservation, and destruction. Some also believe that this is the day when Lord Shiva married Goddess Parvati.

On this occasion, devotees perform Rudrabhishek, a special ritual in which the Shiva Lingam is bathed with sacred offerings like milk, honey, and water while chanting the Rudra prayers. India is home to 12 famous Jyotirlingas, which are considered highly sacred. Some of the most well-known Shiva temples include Kashi Vishwanath in Varanasi, Mahakaleshwar in Ujjain, Somnath in Gujarat, Kedarnath in Uttarakhand, Rameshwaram in Tamil Nadu, and Kalahasti in Andhra Pradesh.

To conclude, Mahashivaratri is a night of spiritual purification, where devotees seek to remove darkness from within and welcome the light of wisdom and knowledge. As the new day begins, it symbolizes a fresh start filled with positivity and divine blessings. This festival reminds people of the importance of self-discipline, devotion, and spiritual awakening.
